


and picnickers can relax and enjoy the scenery.




The Bare Knuckle Boxing Hall of Fame (BKBHOF), located in Belfast, NY, is the only Hall of Fame dedicated to remembering and honoring both current and pioneer bare knuckle boxers and their supporters. The BKBHOF is housed in the original 1889 barns where the great John L. Sullivan trained to prepare for the epic 75-round Bare Knuckle Boxing World Championship bout against Jake Kilrain!



These barns were owned by Sullivan's trainer who was not only the world's first fitness guru but also the World Greco-Roman Heavyweight Wrestling Champion of his time, William Muldoon. Muldoon is known as the "Father of the Modern Medicine Ball." He was also an innovator of other exercise tools used by today's athletes. Today, Muldoon's fitness regimens of yesteryear are still quite popular and considered "old school" -- meaning his fighters also trained by chopping up piles of wood, jogging local trails, blacksmithing and working heavy ropes. These barns were locked for 120 years until the BKBHOF owner and president, Mr. Scott Burt, restored them and began sharing them with the public in 2009.




Eagle statues are the icons of Ashland University and well-established pieces of campus culture. The tradition began in 1941 when, as a prank, students stole a 400-pound advertising emblem from a local Case Implement dealership in Wooster. Perching on a cement globe in front of the Recreation Center, "Old Abe" is the largest of the flock. He was a gift from Case, with the assumption that after he came to campus, Ashland students would stop stealing eagles from the dealerships. In the five years after Ashland received old Abe, four new eagles had been stolen; since 1941 approximately 30 eagles have made their way to the campus.

There has been a mill on Lanterman's Falls since 1799. The current structure on Mill Creek near Youngstown, OH, was built in 1845 and used solely as a gristmill. After falling into disrepair, it was purchased and repurposed by Mill Creek MetroParks in 1892 and held a ballroom, concession stand and bathhouse for swimmers. In 1933 it was converted to a nature museum; it became a historical museum in 1972. Lanterman's Mill was entered into the National Register of Historic Places in 1976. This community treasure was fully restored 1982-85.




The Butler County, PA courthouse is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Located in downtown Butler, the high Victorian Gothic style courthouse was built in 1885.

The courthouse is a depository for county historic documents and artifacts as well as a center for community activities, speeches, political rallies and concerts.



Located in southwest Pennsylvania's Laurel Highlands and built in 1935, Fallingwater is


Frank Lloyd Wright's crowning achievement in organic architecture and widely considered the
all-time best work of American architecture. Its owners, Edgar and Liliane Kaufmann, were a
prominent Pittsburgh couple, known for their distinctive sense of style and good taste. In 1963
the Kaufmanns donated the property to the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy, together with
1,543 acres of surrounding land. It opened its door as a museum in 1964 and has since hosted
more than five million visitors.








Located near Cairo and Harrisville, North Bend State Park offers a multitude of recreational facilities in a beautiful rural setting. Named for the horseshoe curve of the North Fork of the Hughes River, this year-round park is lush with hiking trails and abundant wildlife. North Bend State Park is best known for the 72-mile North Bend Rail Trail, which follows a railbanked B&O Railroad corridor and features several tunnels along the way.





The museum is a full-size replica of Drake's engine house and derrick. Built in 1945, this structure encloses the famous well and Edwin L. Drake traveled to Titusville, Pennsylvania in 1857 as an agent of the Seneca Oil Company of Connecticut. His mission features working reproductions of the wood-fired boiler and steam engine that Drake used to drill and pump oil from the well. In 1859, the Drake Well struck oil at 69½ feet, giving birth to an industry that has forever shaped our modern world. was to find and produce crude oil in quantities that would make it commercially successful for refining into kerosene.



Built in 1972, the Gazebo in Uptown Park in Medina, OH is the signature landmark of the city. The gazebo plays host to concerts and weddings, and is the backdrop for community events including the Medina County farmer's market, Art in the Park, and Affair on the Square.







The Frank Gatski Memorial Bridge is a 900-foot cable-stayed bridge crossing the Ohio River at Huntington, WV and Proctorville, OH. Bridge planning started in the early 1970s.


Construction began in 1983 and was completed in 1985. It was the first bridge of its type in West Virginia, utilizing concrete instead of steel for its construction. The bridge was renamed during halftime of the Marshall-UTEP Football game on November 18, 2006, for Marshall University's first member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Frank "Gunner" Gatski.






